General Information

Introduction

This document assesses the risks associated with Ruddington Grange Golf Course, in order that Ruddington Grange Golf Club Limited complies with its policy to protect its members, employees, franchisee, contractors, members of the public, and the environment. This Risk Assessment does not cover the Clubhouse, and the other buildings on the site, nor the greenkeeping staff's work duties.

General Course Topography

Ruddington Grange Golf Club is set on 110 acres of land. The main A60 road runs alongside the easterly side of the golf course, while Wilford Road runs alongside the west side of the course. There is a new housing development at the back of the golf course, with two houses overlooking the course. There is a private road that runs alongside the 1st hole and the practice ground. Three streams run from east to west along the golf course. The first stream runs from the left of the second fairway across to the right of the second green. The next stream is on the 4th, past 6th, back of the green on the 10th & 17th. The second stream (brookside) runs from the 5th, past the 6th, 16th and through the 17th. The level of water is between 300mm & 500mm. There are 2 ponds on the golf course (4th & 16th) which are no deeper than 1m deep at full depth. Apart from the slope on 7th and 11th, Ruddington is a flat course built on clay.

Staff Working on the Course.

Staff and contractors working on the golf course have priority at all times in terms that players must not play shots which would be in range of the staff and/or contractors and thus endanger them.

Use of Trolleys, Electric Trolleys and Motorised Buggies.

Buggies are allowed on the golf course when the ground conditions permit. Some routes are signposted where it has been deemed necessary. Where buggies are hired from the Club, each buggy will be provided with a briefing note on the use of the buggy. Any visitor who wishes to use their own buggy will also be given a copy of the briefing note and must produce a copy of their insurance certificate providing 3rd Party Public Liability Insurance cover before being allowed to use the buggy on the Golf Course. Members who own their own buggies must provide the Club with a copy of their 3rd Party Public Liability Insurance cover each year on membership renewal.

All buggy drivers must be over the age of 17 years.

Reduced Visibility Weather Conditions.

When foggy conditions prevail, the Estates Manager or Club Professional will stand on the 1st White Tee and if the hump on the left hand side (the old bunker) of the fairway is not in view he will place a sign advising the membership that the course is closed. This will be reviewed over the next couple of hours by the Club Professional or his representative.

Lightning Policy

In event of lightening or threat of lightening the course will be closed by the Estates Manager or Professional Staff.

The air raid siren will be taken by buggy and sounded at 12th & 14th tees to ensure all golfers can hear. For closure of the course it will be sounded once. A sweep of the course will take place and all players will be told that they must immediately vacate the course; it is not an option to continue at your own risk.

Signs are to be put on 1st and 10th tees stating the course is closed.

The course may be re-opened by Club Official or Professional Staff by the sounding of the air raid siren 3 times, once the risk of lightening has passed. The closure signs will be removed.

Trees

There are numerous trees around the course. There is a need to be aware of the root systems and overhanging branches of these trees when playing your shot in close proximity to the trees. There is also a risk of branches being blown off when there is a strong wind. During a prolonged dry spell in the summer, "summer limb drop" is possible from any tree. If you hear a loud crack and are under a tree run for open space in case it is an occasion of 'summer limb drop'. Report any loud noises coming from trees to the Club Office/Pro-shop at the earliest opportunity.

Paths

Where paths are available on the course all golfers whether walking, using a trolley or buggy must use them.

Footwear

All golfers (members & visitors) must ensure they have golf shoes which are adequate and suitable for the ground/weather conditions on the day of play.

Players Insurance

All golfers (Members & Visitors) are advised to take out adequate 3rd party insurance to provide cover for liability at law for damages payable in respect of:

Death or bodily injury.

Loss of damage to material property.

Responsibilities

The General Manager is responsible for maintaining this risk assessment.

Overview of Risk Assessment Definitions.

The risk assessment will address the following:

- Generic risks whilst playing golf.

- Risks whilst carrying Clubs and using motorised and pull trolleys in dry and wet conditions
- Risks whilst driving motorised buggies in dry conditions.
- Risks whilst driving motorised buggies in wet conditions.

Risk Assessment.

The Risk Assessment is presented in two categories:

- Generic Risks
- Risks on a hole by hole basis for the 18 hole course

For each hole the type of risk will be graded as detailed below:

- L= Low or Little Risk
- M= Medium Risk
- H = High Risk
-

Where there is a Medium or High a possible solution /recommendation to eradicate or reduce the risk will be suggested.

When defining the location of a risk by reference to a particular hole this is ascertained by looking from the Tee towards the Green.

Bridges

There are several bridges which cross the Fairham Brook and a variety of bridges that cross the ditches, they have been designed and constructed to suit their purpose whether it be safe access and egress of members and visitors or allow for heavy course maintenance equipment use so they are safe for all golfers walking carrying clubs, pushing or pulling a cart as well as electric trolleys and golf buggies. All bridges are clearly wide enough for buggy use and should be used, additionally buggies should keep away from the bridge edges and cross in the centre.

Using Motorised Buggies in Wet Conditions.

If the Estates Manager considers that the use of motorised buggies on wet ground is likely to endanger drivers, passengers, and other players then he will inform the staff in the Professional's shop that motorised buggies must not be rented out to members and visitors until further notice is given. The Estates Manager will also post notices in the information board and trolley shed outside the Professional's shop which will inform any golfer intending to use a motorised buggy that use on the particular day is forbidden. If the Estates Manager is absent from work then his responsibilities in this respect will pass to his Deputy (Head Greenkeeper).

RISK=High from buggies skidding uncontrollably or overturning, causing injury to drivers, passengers, and walking players.

SOLUTION= Banning the use until conditions are suitable.

THE CLUB'S COMPREHENSIVE UPDATED RISK ASSESSMENT IS AVAILABLE IN THE CLUBHOUSE AND ON THE CLUBS WEB SITE.

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT ALL MEMBERS READ THE COMPREHENSIVE VERSION.

IF ANY DOUBT EXISTS AS TO ANY ASSESSED RISK AND SOLUTIONS TO IDENTIFIED RISKS THEN THESE ARE TO BE CONVEYED TO THE CLUB OFFICE FOR CLARIFICATION.

1. Be aware of the behaviour of other golfers and their place on the course. Do not play a shot until you are sure there is little risk of your ball hitting any other person particularly if you are hitting towards an area hidden from your view. Always shout "FORE" if you hit a wayward shot.
2. In foggy conditions do not attempt to play if restriction notices are placed on the 1st tee.
3. Many bunkers have steeply sloping sides. The risk of slipping on these slopes is high. Always enter and leave from the lowest point and never take trolleys on to these slopes.
4. Some tees and greens have sloping sides. To avoid risk of slipping and skidding do not take trolleys on to slopes surrounding tees and use purpose built paths.
5. In wet conditions many slopes are very slippery. It is essential that footwear designed for golf is worn at all times. In addition slopes considered to be particularly risky and to be avoided are e.g. Back right hand side of the 2nd green/front and back of the 5th green/the perimeter bowl shaped green on the 8th/the walk towards the fairway on the 13th.
6. There are two ponds containing water approx. 1m deep (4th and 16th holes) and eleven dikes a varied depth of water. All have steeply sloping sides and are designated as water hazards by red posts. Entry to the areas on the pond side of the red posts

should be made only in extreme circumstances and with great care. No trolleys or buggies are to be taken on the pond side of the red posts.

7. Directional notices are in place on the course, Deviation from indicated directions will be at the entire risk and responsibility on the individual.

8. The Estates Manager is responsible for deciding if buggies can be used on the course if conditions are wet. His decision will be relayed to the Professional's shop.

9. Any accidents occurring on the course are to be reported immediately to the Club Office or if the office is not attended, to the Professional shop which the accident book will be used for a full report of the incident.

Appendix B – Policy for the use of motorised buggies over the winter months

For the purposes of this document the winter period is generally regarded as being November to April. This is a new approach and as yet to be tried and tested so it will be monitored regularly and can be overridden at any time by the Estates Manager who has the right to ban all buggy users if deemed necessary. During the period above there will be times when all wheeled traffic will be banned and only golfers carrying clubs or those players with medical exemption or registered disabled will be allowed. The Estates Manager in conjunction with the Club Professional and Club General Manager or their deputies will make the decision jointly. The club web site, and a notice on the first tee will all be updated with any restrictions.

Members with Personal Buggies used for health reasons which meet “Ruddington Grange Golf Club Policy” (Member Designated) will be allowed on the course but may be restricted to specific routes detailed in the hole-by-hole risk assessment and additionally may only be allowed to play to certain holes depending on the course conditions at the time. No other use of buggies will be allowed. The Estates Manager bases any decisions on several factors, the main ones are; Whether or not there is a high or unacceptable increase in the risk to the health and safety of players using the buggies. Whether there is likely to be lasting damage caused to the course and whether repair of this damage is likely to result in excessive expenditure or detract from the appearance and playing condition of the course. As the Estate Manager is the most experienced member of staff in these matters, then they, in conjunction with the Club Professional and Club General Manager as above, should remain responsible for this function. He has to make the same judgement when deciding whether to deploy course machinery and whether it is safe to risk the health and safety of his trained and experienced staff when they drive the machinery on the course. Situations will arise when conditions are marginal. The Estates Manager should then consider whether a part of the course could be made available to those players who provide medical certification that states that they will not be able to play

if the use of motorised buggies is temporarily suspended. If these conditions are met and the Club General Manager is satisfied that those members comply with the medical conditions, then a route will be specified for buggy users by reference to the course Risk Assessment and the prevailing ground conditions. This route will not include any holes where the Estates Manager considers the risk to be unacceptable. "Member Designated" buggy drivers will also be expected to drive only on specified parts of These holes i.e. in the rough (see hole by hole risk assessment). It is likely that the numbers of members wishing to avail themselves of this facility will be few. It should be the responsibility of the Club General Manager / Pro-shop to ensure they are fully briefed on what is expected of them.
